Friendship can sometimes be the determining factor of an exhibition in which individualism, generosity, empathy, responsibility and play meet. This junction favours dialogue over pride.

The sober, priggish and refined curatorial discourses are here defied by the relaxed proximity of artists, media, generations and themes. The absence of hierarchies and conceptual connections between works signifies that the cohesion of the exhibition should not be sought in the logic of one theory or another, but in the energy of closeness. This is the challenge put forth by Mircea Cantor last year under the title "Salon". However, this is an Art Salon that does not have anything in common with the old career and status certifying institution. Each artist is invited to exhibit whatever he/she deems significant in his/her current laboratory without pressure or constraints. The Summer Salon presents an occasion for the coming together of very different human and artistic journeys in the context of a visual richness undertaken by both the participants and the public.

Aceasta este provocarea lansată de Mircea Cantor anul trecut sub

numele de Salon. Dar un Salon de Artă în care nu se mai regăsește nimic din vechea instituție de certificare a carierei sau a statutului. Fiecare artist este invitat să expună ceea ce consideră important din laboratorul lui actual, fără presiuni sau constrângeri. Salonul de vară este ocazia întâlnirii unor trasee umane și artistice foarte diferite în condițiile unei bogății vizuale asumate atât de participanți, cât și de public.

Rudolf Bone (b. 1951) lives and works in Oradea, Romania. Bone is a performance artist coming from the 80s generation of Romanian artists working in Oradea with a group of experimentalist artists gathered around Atelier 35. Bone's works from the 80s oscillate between cosmogonic themes and political irony. In 1993 he gave up art and he destroyed all his works along with his photographic archive. Fifteen years later, he came back on the art scene and restarted his career with powerful and emotional performances and sculptures.

Corneliu Brudaşcu (b. 1937) lives and works in Cluj, Romania. From the beginning of his career, Corneliu Brudaşcu has been known as a remarkable draughtsman and colorist. His works were unrivaled as he started to show them in Romanian exhibitions at a time (the mid- seventies) when the influence of Socialist Realism was beginning to decline. (...) His compositions, especially those portraying individual people, come to life out of a sort of emptiness each time they are looked at. this effect often seems to be engendered by a whirl of wildly laid brushwork, which gradually reveals the drama of a physical expression or the lineaments of a face. (Alexandru Vlad)

Sorin Câmpan (b. 1940) lives and works in Cluj, Romania After a series of detours and nuanced reflections on the conceptual tools that may shape how painting is thought of, Sorin Câmpan's work achieved an apparent simplicity. these works must be carefully "read" in order to grasp their enigmatic composition and elusive meaning. What appears as simple images conceals a mystery that is localized and specific, without providing an actual interpretation or explanation, in a fashion somewhat similar to the metaphysical painting to which Câmpan feels particularly allied.

Belu-Simion Făinaru (b. 1959) lives and works in Haifa, Israel and Antwerpen, Belgium. Făinaru works in various domains of visual art, creating three-dimensional works and video by means of the objects and environments he designs. While constructing layers of meaning that touch upon Jewish Romanian history, pieces of text, and issues of identity and territory, his works sensitively and deeply address universal human themes. They constitute a complex tapestry of contrasts and contradictions that characterize life, dealing with topics such as wandering and home, religion and secularity, sanity and madness, memory and forgetting, language and visual art

Adrian Ghenie (b. 1977) lives and works in Cluj, Romania and Berlin. Adrian Ghenie paints images of places marked by history and camouflaged as ordinary sites, as well as characters usually placed in a cinematic setting. The tensions between familiar and yet strange determine a reading of his works as mysterious and uncanny. The artist questions constantly the historical loads and the rewriting of art history.

Gheorghe Ilea (b. 1958) lives and works in Zalău Romania. Gheorghe Ilea explores the boundary between consistency and a certain hypnotic density in his images. there is an intellectual exuberance fueling Ilea's works, with painting acting as a medium of research, rather than as a safe aesthetic bet or a mystical springboard. His recent exhibition at the Dalles Hall in Bucharest, Tronicart 1300, consists of 56 car hoods of the popular Dacia brand painted as an ironical and emotional portrait of the Romanian society and of himself as well.

István László (b. 1981) lives and works in Dublin and Târgu Mureş. István László believes that the most important role of the artwork is its power to reshape our understanding of history, of the contemporary world and most importantly of our relationship to it. His work takes the form of objects, photographs and videos, often presented with dark humor that originates the artist's background and the things that marked the development of his identity.

Dan Mihălţianu (b. 1954) lives and works in Bucharest, Berlin and Bergen. His artistic practice could be described as a process-oriented discourse, including historical, socio-political and trans-cultural aspects.

Ciprian Mureşan is the editor of the magazine Version, and since 2005 a member of the editorial board of the art magazine IDEA arts + society.

Leonard Vartic (b. 1970) lives and works in Cluj, Romania Leonard Vartic's works are reflections of his personal universe, alongside his obsession with anatomical disintegration and corrosion. the figures that appear in his drawings, usually the artist himself, hide a psychological burden in camouflage costumes or in their posture, turning their backs on the viewer or keeping their heads down, the subjects of his works approach the limits of the human condition – a theme originated in romanticism and decadentism – always revealing more than what rational thought can describe.
